Recap: The Six Triple Eight Chattanooga Premiere

On February 13, 2020, an enthusiastic crowd of 250 gathered at the UTC University Center Auditorium to enjoy the Chattanooga premiere of *The Six Triple Eight*, Lincoln Penny Films' documentary about the Women's Army Corps' 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion. The 6888th were the only all-female, all African American unit (other than nurses) to serve overseas during World War II. Before shipping out to England in 1945, the unit spent two weeks at Fort Oglethorpe for overseas training.
